High court broadens the president's power to deport people and block them at border

WASHINGTON—The Supreme Court on Thursday did what few legal professionals had hoped for: It handed down a series of rulings that will make it easier for the president to deport people and block them at the border.

The court's decision in *Immigration and Naturalization Service v. Chadha* (543 U.S. 915) is a landmark ruling that will make it easier for the president to deport people and block them at the border.

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tion was driven by racial prejudice when the secretary of homeland security for Italian immigrants, Trump has recently designated Haiti as likely and dangerous and called it a "vulnerable country."
