Apple Sues OpenAI, Claiming Theft

Suit by iPhone maker says AI firm used trade secrets to try to build own devices

Apple sued OpenAI and one of its top executives Friday alleging the AI company stole trade secrets as part of its effort to develop competing devices.

The civil suit filed in the Northern District of California accuses OpenAI's chief hardware officer, Yang Sun, and Chase Lila, a member of its technical staff, of taking Apple's confidential information through various methods, both are former Apple employees who went to work for OpenAI.

The lawsuit details how the relationship between the two companies has deteriorated since 2021, when they signed a deal to have OpenAI's Chat GPT work with Apple's Siri assistant. In 2024, it was joined by Google's Gemini tech stack.

Sun is leading OpenAI's efforts to develop its own devices, a crucial strategic effort so that the company can reach consumers directly, rather than via other companies' devices such as Apple's iPhone.
